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***Course Overview and Objectives***

FIN 3063 is an introductory course on investments. The course will focus on the characteristics, valuation, and trading of stocks, bonds, and other financial instruments. By the end of the course, you should have the following skills and knowledge: (1) understand the risks and potential rewards available from various financial instruments, (2) be familiar with the investing process and the operations of financial markets, and (3) know how to formulate appropriate investment strategies.

***Required materials***

**2) Lecture Notes**

Lecture notes for each class will be posted on Blackboard. They are designed as a general guide to the in-class discussion. The lecture notes contain *intentional* gaps that can be filled during the course of class. Many problems are set-up in the notes, but not worked out (that will be done in class). I strongly recommend printing the lecture notes for upcoming classes in advance.

**3) Calculator**

A financial calculator is recommended. The Texas Instruments BA II Plus (or Plus Professional) is the easiest to obtain and has only a small learning curve.

***Classroom conduct***

Your college education should help you prepare for a professional career. As such, my expectation is for you to come to class on time, be prepared, and participate. This class will

be administered in a business-like manner. Unless absolutely necessary, do not eat during class (drinks are fine). *Refrain from the use of cell phones and computers for non-academic purposes.* Repeated violations of this policy will result in your removal from that day's class.

### ***Attendance Policy***

I do not take attendance. However, the choice to not regularly attend class is a serious mistake for the vast majority of students. I recommend borrowing a classmate's lecture notes to fill in the gaps if you are absent.

### ***Homework***

Throughout the course, I will provide problem sets based on the course material. I will not grade the problem sets, but will provide solutions. The problem sets are strictly voluntary, but it is very doubtful you will succeed in the course without putting a thoughtful effort into their completion.

I do not curve individual exams. If necessary, I will apply a curve to the overall grade at the end of the semester. I do not negotiate over course grades privately.
